He is advocating for all the Union County municipalities to pass an ordinance or a resolution and then he will petition the County Commissioners for the same.

- Troy Zimmerman, Mifflinburg resident, supports citizens being able to defend themselves in their homes and in public; supports for the 2nd Amendment.
- Will Zimmerman, Mifflinburg resident and Buffalo Township Supervisors, asked that those with questions about 2nd Amendment Sanctuary Ordinance, call Buffalo Township.

- Lisa & Scott Weisel, EBT resident, asked supervisors to act according to resident's decision on constitutional or unconstitutional. They stand for the 2nd Amendment.
- Anne Sloan, EBT resident, a firearm owner, a volunteer for the Union County SASO, will talk with anyone who has question about the 2nd Amendment.
- Shari Jacobson, Union Township resident, supports the 2nd Amendment but stands with Moms Demand Action for Gun Sense in America and upholds the power of the constitution.
- Winda Walker, Union Township resident, in her opinion, criminals will never follow the rules and supports Shawn and 2nd Amendment.
- Wendy McTammany, EBT resident, supports leave the constitution laws as they are, asked the supervisors to act accordingly.
- Tom Duck, EBT resident, law is decided by the courts and it isn't the townships role to change the law, it is for the courts to determine.
- Tripat Singh, EBT resident, is not in support of the proposal; is in support of the constitution and bill of rights.
- Sandy Field, EBT resident, not against the 2nd amendment but there should be laws as to who should have guns and red flag laws to protect those who don't have guns.
- Leroy Fisher, EBT resident, has a business in the Lewisburg Area and is in support of the 2nd Amendment and he invited anyone who has never handled a gun to the gun club for a demonstration.
- William Flack, Mifflinburg resident, supports common sense gun laws.
- Jen Shabihang, EBT resident, supervisors should not be considering this ordinance; it is up to the courts on constitutionality.
- Jonas Pfleagor, White Deer resident, noted that we can't have patch work in both the state and federal courts. Agrees that any individuals that break into your home will cause more harm than those who have guns.
- Matt Farrand, feels strong both ways
- Randy Whipple, Milton resident, supports Shawn and the 2nd Amendment; doesn't feel guns are the problem unless you are the person who pulls the trigger. It's like drinking and driving are you going to take our cars away?
- Thesesa Yerger, recently moved to the township, has experience working for a police force; shared her personal experience living with a person who was violent and the struggle to get a PFA. She doesn't support the 2nd Amendment ordinance and asked, the supervisors to let the courts decided what is right and wrong.
- George Botelbro, recently moved to the township, is a Marine Corp Veteran in marksmanship. Agrees with the 2nd Amendment but believes the ordinance is a rush job and doesn't explain the red flag laws.

- Paul Haines, Buffalo Township resident and supervisor, would like to talk with anyone that has questions about the red flag laws and constitutional rights.
- Max Andrew, Buffalo Township resident, noted statics show that the majority of people do own guns and if they do harm to anyone or themselves, it is because they shouldn't have been in possession of a firearm.
- Chris Shabanowitz, EBT resident, supports the 2nd Amendment would like more background checks, the number of guns a person could purchase at a time and enforcing other red flag laws.
- Sara Kelley, EBT resident, supports the 2nd Amendment but does not support the Ordinance that is in the hands of the supervisors.
- Jim Buck, EBT resident, didn't know much about this ordinance until he did some research; is concerned with how this ordinance will affect the township and the residents.
- Tina Prownat, EBT resident, supports Shawn, thanked all those who attended from the difference areas, would like to see a tally of all those in support or against the 2nd Amendment ordinance. Doesn't want her right to be taking way.
- Jordi Comas, Lewisburg Borough resident, supports the constitution, would like everyone to know that we all have rights whether it is today or tomorrow. We can all agree to disagree about the 2nd Amendment and there is balance in our rights.
- Deirdre O'Connor, Mifflinburg resident, agrees with the common-sense laws but doesn't support the endorsement of the ordinance being presented to public.
- Mckenna Mowry, EBT resident, is a student at Lewisburg Area High School and a student representative for Moms Demand Action for Gun Sense in America, she worries that school is not safe for students to attend; asked the supervisors to consider public input.
- Scott Vance, EBT resident, shared his experience being a resident of other countries and always feeling safe, but does not feel as safe in the United States. There needs to be laws that protect all of us.
- Evan Hart, EBT resident, is a student at Lewisburg Area High School and a student representative for Moms Demand Action for Gun Sense in America.
- Kimberley Drexler, EBT resident, would like the supervisors to be cautious about the 2nd Amendment Ordinance.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the State's stay-at-home order and the advocating for the practice of social distancing, the Township Board used a virtual meeting format that allowed for Township elected and appointed officials and members of the public to participate in the regular monthly meeting of the Board of Supervisors.

The change for the meeting "location" was advertised in al local newspaper and meeting registration and options for submitting public comments were provided on the Township website. Prior to the meeting, members of the public were invited to submit questions to any Township elected or appointed official via phone or email. During the meeting, the public was instructed to use the "Raise Hand" feature or the "Q&A" portal in the virtual meeting or they were instructed to send a text message or email to the Township Manager.

Chairman Schumacher called the Board of Supervisors Meeting to order at 5:37 PM.

Those present: Chairman Matt Schumacher; Supervisor James Knight; Township Manager, Stacey Kifolo; Solicitor Peter Matson; and Secretary/Treasurer, Jolene Helwig. Vice Chairman Char Gray was not in attendance.

Members of the public participating via the virtual meeting format: Matt Farrand (Standard Journal); James Buck; Judith Marvin; Ken Field; Ken Ogawa; Kim Wheeler; Lana Snyder; Marilyn Murphy; Nathan Johnson; Tina Prowant; Margaret Marr; and John Kelchner.

Chairman Schumacher reported that the Buffalo Valley Regional Police Commission (BVRPC) Board meeting for April was cancelled and Central Susquehanna Fire and Emergency Services (CSFES) Board meeting for March was cancelled due to the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic. The Buffalo Valley Regional Police Department (BVRPD) is negotiating a new police officer contract. EBT Vice Chairman Gray and BVRPC Chairman Jack Malloy, EBT appointed Commission members, are working with the full Commission on a new contract. Schumacher stated that the crime numbers are down due to the statewide stay at home order.

Township Manager Kifolo reported that on March 19, 2020, East Buffalo Township issued a Declaration of Municipal Disaster Emergency due to the COVID-19, which endangered the health, safety and welfare of person in East Buffalo Township. The township received a notice from the Lycoming County Resource Management Services on March 18th that it was temporarily suspending all municipal recycling services. The township has suspended drop-off and curbside collection. The brush and yard waste collection, also a recycling service, has been suspended. The temporary suspension has no impact on the township burning ordinance. Residents are reminded that burning of refuse is prohibited, regardless of zoning district. Residents should have all received the direct mailed 2020 Spring Recycling Guide. Some have been asking about the service dates in the newsletter. We are asking residents to understand that the printing and mailing period was happening as the COVID-19 situation was developing. As always, the newsletter indicates that the schedule is subject to change, with or without prior notice. Residents should continue to monitor the township website for updates. Street sweeping for the township has not been missed. This service will get underway when we have a full staff complement. COVID-19 will have financial impacts for the Township. Revenue generated by the Earn Income Tax and Local Service Tax are directly tied to employment. The overall financial impacts, will likely reduce real estate transfers and new development, the Township income expected at budget time. The combined impacts could reduce revenue between \$500,000 and \$900,000. Kifolo noted

that while we would much rather put reserve funds to use for improving Township infrastructure, the Township's financial strength will weather this downturn. Berkheimer Tax Innovations, the contracted service provider for the township for Earn Income and Local Service Taxes is providing an extension for some filings. Individuals with questions are encouraged to contact them at HABinc. The 2019 Municipal Annual Audit and Financial Reports have been delayed. Planning Commission will meet Wednesday, April 15th this same virtual meeting platform. Kifolo stated that Evangelical Community Hospital CEO, Kendra Aucker, has been providing weekly reports and updates to local government and community partners. During the call the week of April 6th, she asked for assistance in getting the word out that people need not fear visiting the ER, urgent care or any of their primary and specialty offices. All patients are screened prior to entering with possible COVID-19 patients being treated in areas isolated from the emergency room. They have already had individuals delayed the seeking of medical treatment for fear of contracting COVID-19, only making their situation worse. Evangelical Hospital wants the public t know that they are prepared for this event and people should not fear the seeking of medical treatment.

For the first segment of public comment, attendees were asked to limit comments to matters on the agenda.

Public Comments:

 Matt Farrand, Standard Journal, asked if the Township will be roping off the park like the Lewisburg Borough. He also asked if the supervisors were concerned with what the, at times, lack the safe distancing on the rail trail and if the Buffalo Valley Reginal Police Department would be asked to monitor the trail. In response, Township officials noted that the Township would not e closing the park, but noted the people using open space recreation areas need to practice social distancing.

Chairman Schumacher acknowledged Board receipt of the Buffalo Valley Regional Police Department March 2020 report.

With the courts being impact by the COVID-19 shutdown, we are awaiting information on the rescheduling of those depositions. East Buffalo Township has spent to date \$28,253. This is at an 8% discount; non discount total would be \$30,360.

Township Manager Kifolo provided and update on the 2020 Road Bids. During the March meeting, the Board authorized the advertising of paving and seal coating bids for bid opening on April 8th and to be awarded on April 13th. However, the paving bid was delayed in getting to advertising. The seal coat bid was advertised prior to the State shutdown. The paving project is needed prior to the seal coating; preventing the awarding of the seal coat contract without having a paving contract. Township Manager Kifolo reported that Governor Wolf signed SB841, which among other things provides property tax relief by allowing taxing districts to extend the discount period thorough August 31st, and/or to waive late fees and penalties, essentially extending the face value, for property taxes paid between September 1st and December 31, 2020. The Board of Supervisor must pass a resolution by May 20th. The Union County Commissioners are requesting input from all municipalities. Township Manager Kifolo noted that taxpayers who have paid in April and those potential payees in May would be paying at the face value. By extending the discount period, returns would need to be processed for all April and May payees. Kifolo noted that the probable scenario by the County would be to leave the discount as expiring March 31st, and extending the face value through December 31st, essentially eliminating the penalty period. Each Board member noted that Kifolo should convey to the County Commissioners, their support for leave the discount as expiring March 31st and extending the face value through December 31st.

During the April 13th regular meeting of the Board of Supervisors, Chairman Schumacher had asked that the Board be provided with financial information for the Board to consider issuing 2020 tax rebates for East Buffalo Township property taxes. Manager Kifolo provided projections for revenue reductions based on overall economic and employment downturns, as well as a projected 20% reduction of real estate revenue. The total projected impact is a decrease of approximately (\$1.14M) compared to the original general fund budget. Schumacher stated that Mike Derman (CSFES Board Chairman) is working with Steve Bolinsky to determine if anything specific is needed to schedule necessary meetings with all other board members to discuss business topics.

Vice Chairman Gray reported that BVRA remains closed to the public due to the State order for Union County to be in the yellow phase. This includes pools, parks, skateparks and indoor recreation. Gray stated that the Gymnastic program is holding Zoom classes with 75% participation to keep kids in shape for when the gym re-opens. Pete Bergonia and other members are working on pool maintenance and other park related issues. Director Shirley Brough is working on financial projections for the possible opening of the pool for the summer. Gray reports that the BVRPD reported crime numbers are down significantly in comparison to historical data. Calls for service were down to a third of where they normally would be for the month of April. The BVRPC will be having an information session to start working on the collective bargaining contract with the police department.

Township Manager Kifolo reported that brush and yard waste collection started today with a limited crew due to not having the help for the Lewisburg Penitentiary prisoners and the social distancing. She reported that we are awaiting official word from the Lycoming County Resource Management Services (LCRMS) on their operation status. Until we have confirmation from LCRMS that they are able to provide service, the Township recycling remains suspended. This

includes the drop-off center and curbside collections. Residents are asked to continue to monitor the Township website for updates. Lycoming County Resource Management provided some interesting information and asked for assistance in getting the word out that any household with a confirmed positive COVID-19 should not be recycling material; recyclable materials should be placed in the trash. Aluminum, plastic and tin will not be processed by LCRMS until it has been untouched for 72 hours. Township Manager Kifolo report that Pennsylvania American Water has submitted a request to Pennsylvania Public Utility Commission (PUC) for a rate increase following the companies \$1.64 billion in recent infrastructure upgrades. Green Light Go and ARLE, both PennDOT grant projects for traffic signal upgrades have been progressing during the shutdown. We had a meeting with the contractor, PennDOT, and engineers on Wednesday, April 29, 2020. The mast arms that are needed at the intersection of State Route 15/Bucknell and for the school zone signals on State Route 45 have an approximate 20-week lead time. The contractor is working with the engineers to get materials approvals and then proceeding to order. The contractor is anticipating having construction start in June. Manager Kifolo wanted to acknowledge the work being done by the Union County Emergency Management Services. The services they provide have gone largely unacknowledged, but they are very active behind the scene in the community.

Based on the language of the Intergovernmental Cooperation Act and the existing IGA, the solution Lewisburg wants cannot come from the judicial system. We will be awaiting a response from the Court once they resume operations in Union County.

Chairman Schumacher reported that the Central Susquehanna Fire and Emergency Services (CSFES) Board meeting for May was cancelled due to the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic.

Vice Chairman Gray reported that the Buffalo Valley Regional Police Department (BVRPD) report shows that calls for May were down, compared to the number of calls from last year. The BVRPC will hold a public meeting Wednesday, June 10th at 5:00PM. Gray shared that she found an East Buffalo Township newsletter from 1990 while cleaning at her dad's house. The newsletter referenced information as to what the township had planned to do with Stein Lane. BVRA is prepping for re-opening of the gymnastics programs, summer camps and possibly the pool. The re-opening of the gymnastic program will provide some revenue to help cover the cost of some expenses but not enough; meaning many people have credits on their accounts from earlier in the year before the shutdown. The BVRA recreational programs are restricted to a 50% capacity even in the green phase. Summer camps are allowed but they too have capacity restrictions, so expected revenue that was budgeted for 2020 fall short. Opening the pool will only add to the additional deficit that BVRA faces due to the fact that the pool runs at a deficit. Even without opening, costs for the pool will include adding water and chemicals, fixing a water pipe and repair the driveway under which the pipe was placed in 1961. BVRA does not qualify for any special COVID funding; although they are a non-profit, the municipal authority status excludes them from eligibility. There is an expected financial shortfall, but unlike years past, this is not a result of bad money management. Shirley Brough, BVRA Director has been extremely diligent and careful in managing the expenses. In order to help with cash flow, she has asked for the 2nd and 3rd guarter payments early from the municipalities. Vice Chairman Gray asked fellow Supervisors to be open to additional 2020 municipal funding for BVRA should their expenses exceed 2020 revenues and available cash reserves. No official action was taken, as the Board will review the matter if it becomes an issue. Chairman Schumacher asked if BVRA would be seeking private donations.

Township Manager Kifolo reported that brush and yard waste collection started its June cycle. She showed the Board of Supervisors and the public an extremely large pile of brush. She stated that she received a phone call from a resident who complained about the amount of time the crew spends on picking up brush and that some residents take advantage of the service at a detriment to other public works projects being completed. She asked that the supervisors think about possibly setting some parameters on size and how long they spend on a pile. The Board did not take action, but general consensus was for no limitations.

Secretary Helwig reported that the township received a certified letter from R-R Donnelley regarding their application to the Department of Environmental Protection for the Air Quality State Only operating permit for its Lewisburg facility located at 1601 Industrial Blvd. The PA DEP issued original State Only Operating Permit #06-00013 on February 2, 2016.

For the first segment of public comment, attendees were asked to limit comments to matters on the agenda.

This meeting format change was advertised in a local newspaper. Members of the public are invited to submit questions to any Township elected or appointed official via phone or email prior to the meeting. During the meeting, the public was provided with options to provide comments via the virtual format.

Chairman Schumacher called the Board of Supervisors Meeting to order at 5:32 PM.

Those present: Chairman Matt Schumacher; Vice Chairman Char Gray; Supervisor James Knight; Township Manager, Stacey Kifolo; Solicitor Peter Matson; and Secretary/Treasurer, Jolene Helwig.

Chairman Schumacher called a public hearing to order at 5:33 PM, to consider and act upon an ordinance amending Chapter 27, Part 2, Section 200, Part4, Sections 402, 407, and 410, and adding Part 5, Sections 503 and 509 of the Code of Ordinances and adding a Solar Energy Systems. The hearing was closed at 6:29 PM.

Public Comments for Solar Ordinance:

- Carolyn Coldren, EBT resident, thanked the supervisors for the work on the solar ordinance, she encourages the development for farmers; industrial use; and residents so they can diversify their income.
- Dr. Victor Udo, EBT resident, thanked the supervisors and others that engaged in creating the solar ordinance. Supports the development of renewable energy in East Buffalo Township.
- Sandy Field, EBT resident, supports the ordinance; thanked the supervisors for the work on the solar ordinance.
- Andrew Stuhl, EBT resident, thanked the supervisors for the solar ordinance consideration and encourages as much as possible solar energy development in the township.
- Scott Vance, EBT resident, via the webinar Q&A portal cited, US government "leaks of these materials could be harmful to the environment. US environmental laws regulate the use and disposal of these types of materials." The greatest risk regarding these chemicals comes in the mining and production process. Why are we concerned with too much solar? Isn't the greater risk that we have to little (solar) causing increase air pollution from fossil fuel energy production?
- Judith Marvin, EBT resident, thanked the supervisors for the ordinance; questioned the height of the solar panels; and questioned the minimum and maximum size of the acres a solar array can be develop in the Zoning District of Agricultural Preservation (A-P) and Agricultural Residential (A-R).
- Molly McGuire, EBT resident, is an environmentalist chemist. Informed the supervisors that the heavy metals leaching out of photovoltaic cells is not an issue on working photovoltaic cell. The issue becomes a problem when they are no longer functioning and taken to the landfill for disposal and buried in the ground.
- Robert Langton, EBT resident, thank you for supporting and coordinated this evening meeting. He asked that the supervisors summarize the remaining process for review of the final draft document. Kifolo reported that the document was made available for public review after the last meeting and advertised for the public to make comments prior to this meeting or during the hearing process of this meeting. She stated that if the supervisor

passed this ordinance at tonight's meeting it would take affect five (5) days from the date the ordinance is signed by the supervisors.

- Township Manager Kifolo, asked Makenzie Stover, CKCOG Zoning Officer, if she had any documentation from the Union County Planning Commissioners following their review of the draft ordinance. Stover reported that she had a phone conversion with Shawn McLaughlin, Union County Planning and Economic Development Director, but as of the meeting had not received a written response. Stover noted that McLaughlin does not have any issues with the ordinance; he was not comfortable with solar as an allowable use in Agricultural Preservation (A-P) and Agricultural Residential (A-R) but understands the reasoning for placing them in those zoning districts. Stover stated that when she receives the letter from McLaughlin, she will forward it to the Township.
- Tina Morris, EBT resident, thanked the supervisors, very supportive of the solar ordinance, concerned about nothing in the ordinance about the topography of the land.

The reopening of the gym and gymnastic program is limited capacity and participation but will provide some revenue to help cover the cost of some expenses but not enough. Many people have credits on their accounts from earlier in the year before the shutdown. The BVRA recreational programs are restricted to a 50% capacity even in the green phase. Summer camps are running but they too have capacity restrictions, so expected revenue that was budgeted for 2020 fall short. BVRA does not qualify for any special COVID funding; although they are a non-profit, the municipal authority status excludes them from eligibility. There is an expected financial shortfall, but unlike years past, this is not a result of bad money management. Shirley Brough, BVRA Director has been extremely diligent and careful in managing the expenses. In order to help with cash flow, she has asked for the 2nd and 3rd guarter payments early from the municipalities. Vice Chairman Gray stated BVRA has applied to five different grant options, but they have not received any information back on their applications. Township Manager Kifolo reported that a storm downburst and heavy rains on Wednesday, July 8, 2020 caused downed trees, many of which required clearing from roadways, significant berm erosion, clogged stormwater inlets, and destabilization of several stormwater pipes. Immediate attention to infrastructure needs was the highest priority. The Public Works Department will begin a special collection of brush and yard waste for all residents with properties along public streets on Monday, July 20, 2020. The crew will provide service to each public street one time during this round. Kifolo stated the boring work for the traffic lights at the intersection of SR15 & Moore Avenue are schedule for Thursday and Friday of this week. She asked that if you have not sent in your 2020 Census information that you get the information completed and returned. She reported that the paving work on Rural Avenue (North 10th Street to US15) will be postponed until stormwater issues can be resolved.

Secretary Helwig reported that the township has received 334 of the Tax Year 2020 Municipal Real Estate General Fund Tax Relief flyers and 56 have been returned undeliverable. There was a totaled of 2,618 flyers mailed out on July 1st.

- Luiz Felipe Perrone, EBT resident, asked about the heavy truck traffic last Thursday on Pheasant Ridge Road and Old Schoolhouse Road. WCEC has been award a couple of the COVID-19 grants to help with the fiscal impact from the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic.

Vice Chairman Gray reported that the BVRA applied for five (5) different grants, but they have not received any information back on their applications. She stated the pool remains closed for the summer. The re-opening of the gym and gymnastic program is a slow start due to the limited

capacity and that many people have credits on their accounts from earlier in the year before the shutdown. Summer camps are running at half capacity due to the restrictions, so expected revenue that was budgeted for 2020 is falling short of projections. BVRA does not qualify for any special COVID funding; although they are a non-profit, the municipal authority status excludes them from eligibility. There is an expected financial shortfall, but unlike years past, this is not a result of bad money management but in order to help with cash flow, BVRA asked for the 2nd, 3rd and 4th quarter payments early from the municipalities, but they still find themselves to be in a financial problem by mid-September. The BVRA Board will meet on August 26th at 6:00 PM to discuss additional funding to help carry them to the end of the year. Each municipality will receive updated financial figures before their next scheduled monthly meeting. Gray shared that the commission is working with the BVRP Officers Association on the collective bargaining contract; the next meeting is scheduled for Wednesday, August 12th at 5:00 PM. Vice Chairman Gray asked the board to think about a different organizational structure for the Regional Police.

Township Manager Kifolo reported that auditors of Herring Roll and Solomon are nearing completion of the 2019 annual audit; obviously this was delayed due to the shutdown and auditors not going out to offices. Paving should be almost complete; however, we ran into a problem on Rural Avenue which will take a little longer; seal coating will begin when paving is complete. Projects are behind scheduled due to the Coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic. The traffic signal equipment for the upgraded Route 45 school zone signs was expected to ship this week. The traffic signal at the intersection of US15/Moore Avenue and Smoketown Road has had all boring work completed and the new concrete pads to secure the signal poles have been poured and are ready for installment when equipment arrives.

Secretary Helwig reported that the township has received 675 of the Tax Year 2020 Municipal Real Estate General Fund Tax Relief flyers for processing; 315 tax rebate checks have been issued for a total of \$63,323. There were a totaled of 2,618 flyers mailed out on July 1st.

Chairman Schumacher asked Township Manager Kifolo to provide an updated total cost from the beginning of the Lewisburg Borough IGA Lawsuit for all attorney's fees and staff expenses.

The Board of Supervisors took no official action relative to the infrastructure projects presented by Township Manager Kifolo. The PennDOT Green Light Go grant typically opens in January of each year. The second project presented was a replacement of the one-lane bridge on Bull Run Crossing, between Cambridge/Primavera and SR45. The goal would be to install a two-lane bridge. Kifolo contacted Stahl Shaffer the township engineer for a proposal. The third project presented was for the replacement of a large culvert on River Road, between Lan Avon Drive and Lon Avon Drive. The large (wearing) pipe should be replaced with a concrete box culvert.

During the For the Good of the Order segment of the meeting, Township Manager Kifolo showed a map outlining Vernon & Norma Martin's property on Salem Church Road. The Martin's have proposed to put their land in an Agricultural Security area under the Agricultural Area Security Law (ACT 43 of 1981). The supervisors do not need to take any action on this change, unless they are opposed for some reason; otherwise, it automatically takes effect in six (6) months.

For the second segment of public comment, the attendees were welcomed to comment on matters that were discussed during the meeting or topics not appearing on the agenda.

Public Comments:

- Marilyn Murphy, EBT resident, asked the supervisors if Solicitor Peter Matson could attend the Planning Commission on August 19, 2020. She asked about the changing of 50 acres to 25 acres back in 2017. Township Manager replied the Planning Commission had recommended the change, but the supervisors did not approve it. Chairman Schumacher called the Board of Supervisors Meeting to order at 5:35 PM.

Chairman Schumacher announced that an Executive session was held on Thursday, August 13, 2020 at 10:30 AM to discuss potential litigation.

Those present: Chairman Matt Schumacher; Vice Chairman Char Gray; Supervisor James Knight; Township Manager, Stacey Kifolo; Solicitor Peter Matson; Jason Brudecki from Solicitor Peter Matson Office and Secretary/Treasurer, Jolene Helwig.

Members of the public participating via the virtual meeting format: Christine Shabanowitz; Eric Scicchitano (Daily Item); Jean Powell-Warren; Judith Marvin; Margaret Marr; Marilyn Murphy; Mary Beth Griffith; and Tina Prowant.

For the first segment of public comment, attendees were asked to limit comments to matters on the agenda.

Public Comments:

- Tina Prowant, EBT resident, asked about the status on the 2020 Municipal Real Estate General Fund Tax Relief and sending of the Township Recycling Guide to new homeowners. Stacey Kifolo and Jolene Helwig replied that they would answer those guestion during the reports of officials.
- Christine Shabanowitz, EBT resident, asked about the location of the Vernon Martin Broiler House; what steps will be taken for the heavy truck traffic on Pheasant Ridge Road and Old Schoolhouse Road; and who monitors the manure release and what company will be monitoring the broiler house. Makenzie Stover, Zoning Officer replied that she would answer those question during the Vernon Martin presentation.
- David Hall, EBT resident, read a letter asking the board to consider how zoning map changes from Agricultural Preservation (AP) to Agricultural Residential (AR) would impact the community.

Chairman Schumacher reported that the Central Susquehanna Fire and Emergency Services Department (CSFESD) Board will meet on Thursday, September 24th at 6:00 PM, to review the chief's 2021 draft budget projections for the William Cameron Engine Company (WCEC). He stated that he has lived in the area for 15 years but has never heard of any issues or profiling of discrimination with the regional police even before they merged. He would like to thank the police force for what they do for the community.

Vice Chairman Gray reported that a request was made by some residents to do a public Police forum to provide information to the public about the police force. The forum wil include a

presentation by the chief, followed by a question and answer session with the public. The public forum is scheduled for Wednesday, October 7th at 6:00 PM. Residents can participate in person at the East Buffalo Township Community Hall or remotely via the Zoom online format. Residents are asked to pre-register by completing the Police Forum Registration form. A link to the registration form has been added to the East Buffalo Township website. Topics to be discuss are use of force policy; officer training; anti-bias measures; police in schools; prevention/intervention with drug trafficking; prevention/intervention with human trafficking; recruitment and hiring; deescalation measures in conflict situations; complaint procedures and resolutions; local crime statistics; probable cause for stops and searches; and other general questions. Gray stated that Shirley Brough, BVRA Executive Director, would be providing a more detailed report on the BVRA later in the meeting. Gray mentioned that the main water line to the Greenspace Building, where the BVRA office and gym are located, caused them to shut down until repairs were completed. This caused the BVRA to cancel scheduled classes and activities at the Greenspace Building.

Township Manager Kifolo share a 3.5-minute video that had been provided by a resident, showing a time-lapsed public works stormwater project. The traffic signal equipment for the upgrade Route 45 school zone signs is expected to arrive onsite tomorrow and work is to continue over the next three days. The auditors of Herring Roll and Solomon have completed the 2019 annual audit; information has been posted to the Township website; and sent to the Standard Journal for advertising. Kifolo reported that she has received all health care insurance renewals, with the exception of dental and retiree prescription Medicare supplement coverage. Information will be presented to the Board prior to renewals. Kifolo stated she had a meeting with PennDOT and McCormick Taylor concerning the traffic light at Fairground Road and Route 45 and the Rail Trail. A letter has been submitted to PennDOT requesting a speed study for Fairground Road from the intersection of SR45 to Saint Mary Street, with the hope that the State will consider lowering the speed limit, which is now posted as 40 MPH. Kifolo noted that there is still some misinformation and questions being received on the 20% general fund tax relief rebate. Many are under the impression that they are going to receive 20% of the total amount paid. There is a misconception that the 20% applies to the total tax bill received in February, which also includes County taxes and/or a misconception that they will also be receiving a 20% rebate from the Township for their school tax invoice received in July. The letter sent with the rebate check is an example of how the township determines the 20% rebate. The letter does not mean that the check the resident receives will be equal to the example amount. She noted that the idea that people are going to get "20% of the amount they paid" was spoken during Supervisor meeting as a determination that property owners would receive a general fund tax based on the amount paid, either at face or a discount amount.

Secretary Helwig reported that the Fall 2020 – Spring 2021 Recycling Guide Newsletter was mailed to all residents on September 1, 2020; and the Public Works Crew began the fall brush pick up in the township. Helwig stated she has received 957 of the Tax Year 2020 Municipal Real Estate General Fund Tax Relief flyers for processing; 851 tax rebate checks have been issued for a total of \$160,631.58. There were a totaled of 2,618 flyers mailed out.

Chairman Schumacher acknowledged Board receipt of the Buffalo Valley Regional Police Department August 2020 report.

Chairman Schumacher acknowledged Board receipt of the Central Keystone Council of Governments (CKCOG) August 2020 report.

Motion by Chairman Schumacher and seconded by Vice Chairman Gray to recommend approval for a waiver of Section 403.A of the Stormwater Management Ordinance, Recharge Volume Requirement.

Township Manager Kifolo noted an update on the Buffalo Valley Regional Police IGA. The Borough is proceeding with the depositions, a costly endeavor for both municipalities. The BVRP IGA issue is approaching four years that the Borough is refusing to meet with the Township. Kifolo reported that we have paid Matte Evans Woodside \$44,453.80 as of July 31st.

Township Manager Kifolo reported that the proposed sign ordinance amendment was sent to the Planning Commission for their August 19th meeting. The proposed ordinance was discussed but brought up additional questions and issues, therefore, the topic was tabled until their next meeting. Kifolo stated that the Township should possibly consider not including temporary signs in chapter 27, but rather revamp the sign temporary ordinance in chapter 10. Manager Kifolo, Solicitor Matson, and Zoning Officer Stover will further review this matter and resubmit proposals to the Board of Supervisors and the Planning Commission.

BVRA Executive Director, Shirley Nelson Brough, provided the Board with an overview of the impacts COVID-19 has had on the operations of the recreation authority. At the time of the meeting, Brough was projecting an \$80,000 shortfall for the 2020 calendar year. The Board discussed providing BVRA with financial assistance in being able to cover expenses for the year in order to keep the recreation authority operational.

Chairman Schumacher reported that the Central Susquehanna Fire and Emergency Services Department (CSFESD) Board met on Thursday, September 24th at 6:00 PM, but he was unable to attend. He asked Supervisor Knight to give the updated report.

Supervisor Knight reported that the next Central Susquehanna Fire and Emergency Services Department (CSFESD) Board meeting is scheduled for Thursday, October 22th at 6:00 PM to review the chief's 2021 draft budget projections for the William Cameron Engine Company (WCEC). He stated the chief and the board secretary presented the three-year audit report done by the State which contained six (6) compliance findings, all were consider administrative issues and resolved. Knight mentioned that Buffalo Township will increase its fire contribution from \$10,000 to \$15,000 for the 2021 budget.

Vice Chairman Gray reported that the Police forum to provide information to the public about the police force was held on Wednesday, October 7th at 6:00 PM. There were 183 participants signed up remotely via the Zoom online format. The forum included a presentation by the chief, followed by a question and answer session with the public. Not all questions were answered so they will review and answer those questions at the Police Commission meeting scheduled for October 14th at 5:00 PM. Gray stated that Shirley Brough, BVRA Executive Director, was about to request the first \$8,000 monthly fund payment to assist with covering monthly expenses as needed for the shortfall BVRA is experiencing due to the COVID-19 pandemic, when she received the \$20,000 Degenstein Foundation check. Gray mentioned BVRA was awarded \$15,000 from the Union County CARES Grant. With the gymnastic center not being able to open to full capacity BVRA is still expecting a shortfall of \$64,000 through the of January. BVRA is looking ahead at the 2021

budget. Not knowing what the COVID-19 pandemic has in play for activities for next year, the BVRA is projecting to be short \$48,000 for the 2021 calendar year. Gray mentioned that Shirley Brough will be attending the Lewisburg Borough meeting Tuesday, October 13th, to provide the Borough Council Board with an overview of the impact COVID-19 has had on the operation of the recreation authority.

Township Manager Kifolo reported that the traffic signal equipment for the upgraded Route 45 school zone signs has been installed and are functional. The old school zone signs have been removed from the site. The installation of the emergency preemption addition at Fairground Road and Route 45 has been delayed. The intended use of underground conduit for the wiring is not possible. An overhead span wire will be added. The Green Light Go Grant (GLG) project for the replacement of the signal at US15 and Moore/Smoketown and the US15/SR304 signal in Union Township is progressing. The Township received a letter from PennDOT stating a speed study for Fairground Road from the intersection of SR45 to Saint Mary Street, will be completed as requested. Kifolo stated that the River Road Culvert Contract awarded three (3) years ago will be back before the Board during the October 19, 2020 work session. Kifolo mentioned that the September brush and yard waste which started the second Monday in September just finished on Friday, October 9th. The township has seen an increase in issues with mixed piles that cannot be collected by the vacuum truck. The best way to describe it is if you have a handheld vacuum or leaf blower of your own, if material could not be picked up by your equipment it is not going to be picked up by the township vacuum truck without causing problems or even doing damage. The Pension Advisory Committee met on October 6th to discuss both the non-uniform pension and the post-retirement health care investment accounts; no recommendations are being made to the board at this time. The Pension Advisory Committee will review both accounts in March or April and may have changes to recommend to the board. Kifolo stated the Township is advertising for a Public Work Laborer and a Public Work Laborer Mechanic.

Secretary Helwig stated she has that 1,057 Tax Year 2020 Municipal Real Estate General Fund Tax Relief request have been received; 953 tax rebate checks have been issued for 1,086 parcels for a total of \$179,121.13. She mentioned that she received the Conrad Siegal pension disclosure, which was previously emailed to the supervisors.

Chairman Schumacher acknowledged Board receipt of the Buffalo Valley Regional Police Department September 2020 report.

Chairman Schumacher acknowledged Board receipt of the Central Keystone Council of Governments (CKCOG) September 2020 report.

Motion by Vice Chairman Gray and seconded by Supervisor Knight to approve the September 14, 2020 meeting minutes as distributed. Schumacher-y, Gray-y, Knight-y; Motion Carried

Township Manager Kifolo reported that the lawsuit brought against the Township by the Lewisburg Borough has proceeded. Eight (8) depositions were held two (2) each day September 22nd, September 23rd, September 30th, and October 7th.

Chairman Schumacher stated that in his 15 years as a resident he has no recollection of any negativity attached to the regional police or the two departments prior to regionalization. He noted that Chief Yost has done a great job; never sacrificing services but coming in under budget each year. Schumacher noted that the legal costs of the ongoing lawsuit brought by neighbor Lewisburg Borough are mounting, with the current estimate at \$137,000 combined for the municipalities. He

noted that the taxpayers have had to pay this amount. This expenditure is pointless considering that the issues could have been worked out for zero dollars if the Borough had agreed to sit down with the Township. He believes that three options exis:1) the Borough operates a police department and the Township purchases services from them; 2) the Township operates a police department and the Borough purchases services from Township; or 3) the Township withdraws from the regional police department, with 2021 being the Township's last year with the regional department and having their own department in 2022. Chairman Schumacher noted that if the Township voted to withdraw, the municipalities would have time to continue negotiations during 2021. The Board discussed the current situation and with Vice-Chairman Gray that an information session with Chief Yost would be warranted prior to the Board taking official action.

 Margaret Marr, EBT resident, expressed her opinion of the EBT position on the police IGA. In her opinion, the Board of Supervisors should never have reduced their policing or their contribution to the Buffalo Valley Regional Police. She expounded on the need to negotiate and be good neighbors.

Chairman Schumacher reported that the Central Susquehanna Fire and Emergency Services Department (CSFESD) Board will meet on Thursday, December 17th at 6:00 PM, via the virtual Zoom meeting format to discuss the chief's 2021 budget projections for the William Cameron Engine Company (WCEC). This meeting was advertised in the local newspaper.

Vice Chairman Gray reported that the BVRA gym and gymnastic program is shut down due to the Governor's stay-at-home advisory announced on Thursday, December 10, 2020 and in place until January 4, 2021. Gray noted that the fire company is projecting to flood the ice-skating rink on Wednesday provided the ground is frozen at the St. Mary Street Park. Gray stated that staff are planning a virtual BVRA Gala to be held in early March of 2021. Gray reported that the Buffalo Valley Regional Police Commission (BVRPC) meeting was held last Wednesday, December 9, 2020. Gray indicated that the overall police report shows roughly 200 calls less this year then compared to last year. In response to a claim during the public comment period, Gray noted that the township never requested a reduction in police protection; meaning that the Township has not requested fewer PPU than were used in the previous year. Sher further noted that this is a

misconception some members of the public have about PPUs and percentages; all indicating the need for a simpler/easier funding method in a revised IGA.

Township Manager Kifolo reported we are keeping an eye on the winter storm that is to hit the area Wednesday into Thursday. Collection of leaves for the residents was completed and the Public Works Crew is working on inlets and ditches before the winter snowstorm. Kifolo stated she is still working with Jill Shambach, from Susquehanna Community Bank for alternate pension investment management, Conrad Seigel is also a potential option. For the second segment of public comment, the attendees were welcomed to comment on matters that were discussed during the meeting or topics not appearing on the agenda.

Public Comments:

- Joan Moreau, EBT resident, asked if the upcoming legal interaction between EBT and Borough can be posted for the public to attend. Supervisors acknowledged that the pre-trial conference is not open to the public. The trial term for January 19, 2021 through April 16, 2021 is the window in which the judge could schedule the bench trial. Whether or not the proceeding will be open to the public is a decision that the judge will make given the pandemic.
- Margaret Marr, EBT resident, is concerned about the Brown Farm, stated it looks like a dump instead of a recycling compost. She is concerned that the township does not help the residents with the brush and yard waste pick up enough and should invest in alternate forms of collection because the vacuum truck isn't sufficient. Supervisors acknowledged that the township sends out a recycling newsletter stating how to separate the materials in a manner that is easy and cost effect for the crew doing the collection. If residents can't follow the guidelines, the piles will be skipped, a note that collection will happen in the next round if the materials are separated; otherwise, the homeowner will have to hire a landscaper for removal or remove the material themselves. The Supervisors also acknowledged that the Brown Farm is under the County Conservation District and DEP; each are monitoring the site.
- Tina Prowant, EBT resident, is grateful for the work the township is doing in helping with the brush and yard waste. She asked if the \$92,339.83 is part of the contribution paid to the BVRPD under the current IGA. Supervisors acknowledge that \$92,339.82 is part of the 50% request of the 2020 budget. She is concerned that the township always pays more to fund the BVRA program.

EAST BUFFALO TOWNSHIP BOARD OF SUPERVISORS MEETING 589 Fairground Road, Lewisburg, PA, 17837 December 28, 2020

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic surge, the State's stay-at home order and the advocating for the practice of social distancing, the Township Board returned to using a virtual meeting format for this meeting. This allows Township elected and appointed officials and members of the public to participate remotely in this work session of the Board of Supervisors.

The change for the meeting "location" was advertised in a local newspaper and meeting registration and options for submitting public comments were provided on the Township website. Prior to the meeting, members of the public were invited to submit questions to any Township elected or appointed official via phone or email. During the meeting, the public was instructed to use the "Raise Hand" feature, or they were instructed to send a text message or email to the Township Manager.

Chairman Schumacher called the Board of Supervisors Meeting to order at 5:34 PM.

Those present: Chairman Matt Schumacher; Vice Chairman Char Gray; Supervisor James Knight; Township Manager, Stacey Kifolo; Solicitor Peter Matson; and Secretary/Treasurer, Jolene Helwig.

Members of the public participating via the virtual meeting format: Adam Burgos; Alex Wilce; Billy Allred (Union Township); Carolyn Coldren; Carolyn Conner; D. Toni Byrd; Eric Scicchitano (Daily Item); Georganna Kresl; Helen Nunn; Jacob Feuerstein; Jacqueline Lyons (Lewisburg Borough); Jeffrey Nicholson; Jordan Fetzer (Lewisburg Borough); Jordi Comas (Lewisburg Borough); Ken Field; Kevin Mertz (Standard Journal); Lana Snyder; Margaret Marr; Marilyn Murphy; Rick Thomas; Terrell Lehman; and Tina Prowant.

Chairman Schumacher opened the public meeting by reviewing the general history and timeline of the Township's efforts to meet with the Borough of Lewisburg to discuss revisions to the Regional Police Intergovernmental Agreement (IGA) over the past four plus years; even after the Borough of Lewisburg filed a lawsuit against East Buffalo Township and the Buffalo Valley Regional Police Commission. The board read documents and letters from both the Borough of Lewisburg and East Buffalo Township. With nothing materializing the board was now meeting to discuss a resolution to terminate the Buffalo Valley Regional Police Intergovernmental Cooperation Agreement (IGA).

For the first segment of public comment, attendees were asked to limit comments to matters on the agenda.

Public Comments:

- Carolyn Coldren, EBT resident, via email, asked if the supervisors had gotten any input from the police regarding any concerns operational, communication or otherwise about the potential option of splitting the service entities into two separate ones; considered the service and cost; time to stop pursuing going to court and resume original 52/48 payment sharing arrangement; and consider the likelihood that the growth and service area of the Township, both the number of residents and businesses, makes the prior arrangement seem fair. Supervisors responded that it is not about money; it is about a document the makes sense to all parties involved.
- Eric Scicchitano, Daily Item, asked about the Borough letter dated December 23 willing to negotiate if the money was put in an escrow account. He also inquired about the plan for 2022 if the Regional Police Department dissolves. Supervisors acknowledge that the money was

put aside more than a year ago when the Supervisors offered \$45,000. Supervisors are hopeful that the lawsuit will be settled and a new IGA will be written.

- Sue Ellen Feuerstein, EBT resident, asked what the Borough suggestions and responses had been during the meetings of the two municipalities. The Supervisors noted that the Borough attended one subcommittee meeting; nothing was agreed to for changes, but there was some agreement on areas of the IGA that needed to be changed; since that meeting, the Borough has refused to discuss a new or revised IGA.
- Ken Field, EBT resident, asked why the dispute had not been discussed with the commission. Supervisors noted that a motion was made during a commission meeting to abide by the IGA.
- Jordi Comas, Lewisburg Borough Council member, agreed with Matt that the issue is not about money. He thinks the story is not that complicated, but yet that's why it is in court. He noted that purchasing PPUs is a flawed system. He noted that if people want the full story, they should talk to people in the Borough.
- Margaret Marr, EBT resident, expressed her opinion on the EBT position on the police IGA. She expounded on the need to negotiate, be good neighbors and beg for forgiveness. She accused Schumacher of acting like a bull in a china shop and throwing mud in their faces. Supervisors reiterated that numerous attempts were made to discuss the funding, but no response was giving in return. Stacey pointed out areas Schumacher and Mike Daniloff made favorable changes for the Department fiscal operations and the taxpayers. She also noted that it was unfair for Ms. Marr to make such accusations about Mr. Schumacher because she wasn't involved and is therefore using information from others.
- Tina Prowant, EBT resident, thanked the supervisors for saving the township money on the police service. Questioned, but thanked the supervisors for allowing Jordi Comas the option to speak during the public comments.
- Bill Allred, Union Township Supervisor, stated he attended a Buffalo Valley Regional Police Commission meeting to inquire about joining the regional police force; however, he never received the information from the Commission that he requested. Although, in hindsight, it was fine to not receive the information because he would not be willing to join given the Borough's filing of a lawsuit against a neighbor partner because he would be concerned that the Borough would sue his township.

Chairman Schumacher reported that the Reorganizational Meeting and Supervisor Meeting will be held on January 4, 2021 beginning at 5:00PM. This meeting will be held both in-person and using the virtual meeting format.

Vice Chairman Gray reported that the ice-skating rink was flooded at the St. Mary Street Park but the ground needs to freeze.

Township Manager Kifolo reported that the State has extended the River Road Culvert project funding until June 2021. Kifolo noted that the Rural Avenue project from Route 15 to North 10th Street was schedule the week of December 14th, but with the winter storm that fell on December 16th it has delayed the project.

Secretary Helwig reported the deadline for applying for the 2020 Municipal Real Estate General Fund Tax Relief rebate has ended. Helwig noted she has received 1307 of the Tax Year 2020 Municipal Real Estate General Fund Tax Relief flyers for processing which covered a total of 1539 properties; received 9 after the deadline; and 1275 tax rebate checks have been issued to date. Supervisors all acknowledged that there was sufficient time for property owners to submit their request; therefore, any applications received via email or postmarked mailings after December 15, 2020 would not be paid.

Motion by Chairman Schumacher and seconded by Vice Chairman Gray to approve the December 14, 2020 meeting minutes as distributed. Schumacher-y, Gray-y, Knight-y; Motion Carried Motion by Chairman Schumacher and seconded by Vice Chairman Gray to approve Resolution 12-2020, hereby terminating the Intergovernmental Cooperation Agreement between East Buffalo Township and the Borough of Lewisburg, dated March 15, 2011, provided, however, that the said termination shall automatically be rescinded if East Buffalo Township and the Borough of Lewisburg execute a revised Intergovernmental Cooperation Agreement by July 31, 2021. The Chairman of the Board of Supervisors of East Buffalo Township is Directed to notify the Borough of Lewisburg and the Buffalo Valley Regional Police Commission of this action in writing, the same to be delivered on or before December 31, 2020. Schumacher-y, Gray-y, Knight-n; Motion Carried

Motion by Vice Chairman Gray and seconded by Supervisor Knight to ratify the Municipal Disaster Emergency declared on December 16, 2020, due to a severe winter weather event. Said declaration was effective immediately and expired December 22, 2020. Schumacher-y, Gray-y, Knight-y; Motion Carried

- Margaret Marr, EBT resident, expressed her disappointment with the vote that the supervisors took on the resolution for the police Intergovernmental Cooperation Agreement.
- Jordan Fetzer, EBT business property owner, thanked the supervisors for fighting for the residents and for the tax rebate fund, an indication that the Township is doing things right; thanked them for standing up for the residents with their best interest in mind. Noting that no one should apologize for doing what is best for the taxpayers.
